It's a blast from the past – reinvented. Go back to your Soap Box derby days and feel the thrill of your first time driving on your own...flying on your own...the need for speed! The thrill of DIY using upcycled materials, a driving machine made from found objects! Look and you might find a frying pan, garden cart, bicycle wheels from a \$5 yard sale find, dollar store flashlights, hinges from kitchen cupboards, batteries, wooden spools...The artcars have it all, and "every piece on each of the cars has a story," says William Forestall.

Fusing do-it-yourself mechanical know-how with a creative use of salvaged materials, his whimsical vehicles are designed to function as machines that one can actually operate, says Terry Graff, curator and artist.

Come to The George Fry Gallery on Thursday, September 21, and meet the artist, open a hood, study an engine, and talk about car parts; not what you might expect from a gallery exhibition. 8. Craft NB Exhibit featured at the UNB Art Centre Sept 22

The UNB Art Centre is pleased to kick off the school year with the exhibit *Beneath the Surface*, opening September 22 at 5pm, featuring members of Craft NB.

The exhibit, which is curated by Maegen Black, Director of the Canadian Craft Federation, features work by artists from Craft NB who participated in a residency at Fundy National Park this past summer. In partnership with Parks Canada, artists stayed on site for a 5-day period interacting with nature, park interpreters, scientists, educators and each other. Inspired by their explorations of the natural landscape, these artists brought their curiosity and their creativity to bear on such matters as the Fundy tides, the flora and fauna of the Acadian Forest, and wetland ecosystems.

In celebration of Canada's 150th Anniversary, this project hearkens back to an earlier association of craft and nature when Dr. Ivan Crowell gave workshops and classes throughout the summer at Fundy National Park in the 1950s. Dr. Crowell, who died in 2003, is remembered as a pewter smith and tapestry weaver, but also for his lasting cultural legacy, as the founder of the New Brunswick College of Craft and Design.

Beneath the Surface will also provide inspiration to a young generation of artists as students from schools in the Anglophone West District, who will visit the exhibit as part of a Canada 150 educational project. While at the UNB Art Centre, students will draw inspiration from the display, interact with some of the artists, learn more about their own part of the world, participate in hands-on art-based activities and then in turn create their own works of art that will be displayed at their own schools.

Beneath the Surface opens September 22 and runs through October 20, 2017 at the UNB Art Centre but will make stops at a number of venues in the province throughout the year. A catalogue has been produced documenting the residency and creative process and will be available for sale throughout the exhibition. The UNB Art Centre is located at Memorial Hall, located at 9 Bailey Drive, University of New Brunswick. The galleries are open 9am - 4pm weekdays and for special events. Pop Aye 104 mins Thailand, Singapore, 2017 Thai with English subtitles

Principal Cast: Thaneth Warakulnukroh, Penpak Sirikul, Bong

On a chance encounter, a disenchanted architect bumps into his long-lost elephant on the streets of Bangkok. Excited, he takes his elephant on a journey across Thailand, in search of the farm where they grew up together. Pop Aye is a 2017 Singaporean-Thai drama film directed by Kirsten Tan. A debut feature by Tan, the road film tells the story of a man as he tries to take his long-lost elephant back to their rural hometown. The first Singaporean film selected to screen at the Sundance, it competed and won a Special Jury Prize in the World Cinema Dramatic Competition section of the 2017 Sundance Film Festival.

Thana (Thaneth Warakulnukroh), a middle-aged architect, is disillusioned at work as well as at home with his wife Bo (Penpak Sirikul). One day, as he wanders the Bangkok city, he chances upon an elephant which turns out to be his childhood companion, Pop Aye. He then decides to take the elephant back to the rural village where they grew up together and into his uncle Peak's (Narong Pongpab) care. Thus, they embark on their homecoming journey through the rural Thailand to their hometown in Loei Province, Isan.

Following their culinary outings to England's Lake District in *The Trip* and down the Italian coast in *The Trip to Italy*, Steve Coogan (Philomena, *Alan Partridge*) and Rob Brydon (Tristram Shandy) team up once more to indulge in Iberian epicurean delights, trade barbs, and compete to perfect the ultimate Michael Caine impression, in the much-anticipated *Trip to Spain*.

After the success of Coogan's travelogue and reviews of English and Italian restaurants, The New York Times commissions a new piece; this time, he is sent to Spain with the ever-reliable Brydon in tow. Soaking in the culinary riches of the Basque region, which boasts several of the best reviewed restaurants in the world, and moving through the country to the Mediterranean coast, Coogan and Brydon devour envy-inspiring meals, while reviving their iconic and devastatingly funny impressions of Michael Caine, Al Pacino, and Roger Moore (with a new and accomplished Mick Jagger joining the roster).

Between the meals, jokes, and meandering drives throughout the Spanish countryside, cracks begin to show in Coogan and Brydon's optimistic veneer. Despite their insistence that they're at "the sweet spot" of their lives, the pair spends substantial amounts of time reminiscing about their younger selves and earlier films (Philomena is mentioned repeatedly), while negotiating the difficult task of coming to terms with their older selves, and more settled family lives. Still crackling with the improvisational energy and vibrancy of the first two instalments, *The Trip to Spain* provides a reliable mix of breathtaking vistas, indulgent meals, and Coogan and Brydon's hilarious odd-couple comedy.

This year 30 limited release, independent foreign and Canadian films will be shown. Admission is \$8/film, but a yearly film society membership reduces admission cost to \$5/film. 16. Book Launch of Apron Strings: Navigating Food and Family in France, Italy & China Aug 28

Jan Wong knows food is better when it's shared, so when she set out to research home cooking in several countries known for their distinctive cuisine, she asked her 22-year-old son, Sam, to join her. While he wasn't keen on spending excessive time with his mother, he dreamed of becoming a chef and saw an opportunity he couldn't pass up. The result of this exploration, a new book entitled *Apron Strings: Navigating Food and Family in France, Italy and China*.

On their journey, Jan and Sam live and cook with locals, seeing first-hand how globalization is changing food, families, and cultures. In southeast France, they move in with a family who are sheltering undocumented migrants. From Bernadette, the housekeeper, they learn classic French family fare such as *blanquette de veau*. In a hamlet in the heart of Italy's Slow Food country, the villagers teach them without fuss or fanfare how to make authentic *spaghetti alle vongole* and a proper risotto with leeks. In Shanghai, they home-cook firecracker chicken and scallion pancakes with the nouveaux riches and their migrant maids, who comprise one of the biggest demographic shifts in world history. Along the way, mother and son explore their sometimes-fraught relationship, uniting — and occasionally clashing — over their mutual love of cooking

A memoir about family, an exploration of the globalization of food cultures, and a meditation on the complicated relationships between mothers and sons, *Apron Strings* is complex, unpredictable, and unexpectedly hilarious. It holds a place on the CBC and Toronto Star's must-read fall list.

He holds Bachelor degrees from the University of Moncton and Mount Allison; Master's degrees from the Sorbonne, École National Supérieure des Arts Décoratifs, Paris and the State University of New York as well as a PhD from the Université de Paris (Sorbonne). A painter, a filmmaker, playwright, photographer, and writer, Chiasson pushes the limits of all disciplines avoiding the promotion of any particular style in favour of curiosity and research in his eclectic practice. With over 150 exhibitions in major galleries, Chiasson has had a rich career as a visual artist. Equally, he is a teacher and statesman. He has served arts organizations provincially and nationally and is an Officer of the Order of Canada. In his tenure as Lieutenant-Governor of the province his advocacy for the arts has enlightened the province's appreciation and understanding of the value of arts. As noted by John Leroux in his nomination of Mr. Chiasson for the Strathbutler "Herménégilde Chiasson embodies the spirit of an individual who has achieved excellence in his field of visual art and who has made a substantial contribution to the province of New Brunswick"

Continuing a tradition established by the foundation's founder, Sheila Mackay, the newest recipient of the Strathbutler award will be recognised at a public celebration.
